Workshop 5 Origami IoT lamp

The workshop will explore the development of structural Origami like Miura Ori, in order to build a lamp with an innovative approach where the light source is printed on the origami surface.

The participants will learn to prototype LED circuit with simple white LED first and then with addressable LED controlled from their personal smartphone.

The final objective is to construct an interactive technological and digital Origami paper lamp. Necessary materials: conductive copper adhesive tape, white stripe LEDs, programmable LEDs, micro-controllers with wi-fi antenna, smartphones (not supplied), charger such as a mobile phone or an emergency battery for a mobile phone battery charger, soldering kit.

Workshop 7 Public Service Against Extreme Heat in the Cities — Small Things Can Make a Big Difference

The last decade was the hottest on record worldwide, and large cities are warming faster than the planet.

Scientists predict that extreme heat events — already more deadly than all other weather-related events combined—will become more frequent.

Cities are often warmer than their suburbs because of a phenomenon called "the heat island effect." The way a city is designed - the building materials used, the way streets are arranged, the lack of canopy - can actually sequester heat. More than half of the world's population (and growing) live in cities, so interest in figuring out how to cool them down might be growing, too. The goal is to come up with conceptual products and services which could help to reduce the risk of compromising human health in the cities. Urban planners, architects work on a big scale to reduce extreme heat. This workshop focuses on designs in smaller scale which could help people in everyday urban activity as a public service, therefore both urban scale and personal devices are out of scope. At the end of the workshop student groups will present their designs in form of concept drawings, renderings and relevant small scaled models.

Transportation

Airport to

Tel Aviv

Rav Kav

Rav-Kav is an electronic ticket used on public transport in Israel which can be loaded using cash or credit card. The Rav-Kav can be used with both <u>bus</u> and <u>train</u> transportation in Israel. For travelers, an anonymous card is advisable.

There are several designated locations around Tel Aviv, including all of the Tel Aviv train stations, the Central Bus Station (level 6) and in the arrivals hall of Ben Gurion Airport. To purchase a Rav-Kav is 5nis.

Bus

Public transportation depots can be found on the second floor, near Gates 21 and 23. From here you can find buses that will take you to the Egged (Israel's bus service) station at the nearby Airport City (5–10 minutes ride), where you can then transfer to Egged bus to get to Tel Aviv.

<u>Train</u>

The train station is on Level S (the lowest floor), which can be reached from the Arrivals hall by lift, escalators or stairs. You can also purchase tickets from the ticket machines located on Level G. The Ben Gurion airport to Tel Aviv route is fairly frequent (from 3am to midnight).

Note that trains in Israel do not run on the Shabbat; they stop running on Friday afternoon and only resume late on Saturday evening.

There are four stations in Tel Aviv: Tel Aviv University – north; Tel Aviv Savidor Center – center; Tel-Aviv HaShalom – center; Tel Aviv HaHagana – south.

Taxi

Make sure you go with one of these licensed taxis, which can be found on the G (Ground) level of Terminal 3, although you have to "book" one via the onsite dispatchers at the taxi booth. Private-taxi (called "special") and shared-taxi services (called "sherut", and carrying up to 10 passengers) are available. Note that for long trips, the driver must charge passengers according to the Ministry of Transport price list posted in all taxis (for example, there is a 25% surcharge for night trips in effect from 9:01pm until 5:29am (from 4pm on Fridays and holiday eves).

You may also download any of the Taxis phone applications to book a cab wherever you are. The most popular apps are 'Gett' and 'Rider'.
